## Staging of Entries: Sunday $12{ }^{\text {th }}$ September

From 7.30am and to be completed by 10am prompt.
Your Entry cards will be in the hall on arrival
Please make sure you have the exact number of exhibits as stated in the
Schedule.
Stewards will be on hand to help and advise you.
Vases will be provided near the tables that have been set aside to stage your exhibits.
Entries in water must not be done on the show tables.
Prize money will be paid from the Admin table from 2.30 pm .
Exhibits must not be removed before 4.30 pm .

## Definitions:

Class - A numbered entry.
Collection - An assembly of kinds and/or cultivars (varieties) of plants, flowers, fruits or vegetables in one exhibit (class).
Cultivar - is a cultivated variety, simply known as a variety.
Dish - is a specified number or quantity of a fruit or vegetable constituting one entry which may be displayed directly on to the table, or on to a piece of fabric or in a receptacle, of any shape and made from any material.
Display - An exhibit in which attractiveness of arrangements and general effect are considered of more importance than they would have been had the schedule specified a "group" or a "collection"
Novice - A competitor who has not won a prize in that section at a previous Show.

## Rules for Exhibitors

1. The Show will be conducted in accordance with the rules and standards as stated in the RHS Show handbook 2016, except where under the schedule they obviously do not apply.
2. Competition for prizes in all sections is open to all irrespective of status.
3. Exhibits must be the property of the exhibitor, unless otherwise stated and have been in his/her possession for at least six months.
4. Number of Entries per household - only one person per household may compete in a class when the item is grown in the same garden or allotment. This does not apply to needlecraft, cookery, photography or Fuchsia class.
5. Only one entry per person per class.
6. The committee reserves the right to refuse any entry and in the event of such a refusal, it is not required to give a reason.
7. Prizes may be withheld or modified if the exhibits are considered unworthy of the prize offered.
8. Any Exhibit that does not comply with the description in the Show Schedule i.e. in size, number or quantity may be disqualified at the discretion of the Judge and given an NAS card which means 'Not According to Schedule'.
9. The decision of the Judge is final on the relative merits of the exhibits, but the committee reserves the right to refer any points in dispute to the Show Secretary for a decision.
10. Any protest must be made in writing and delivered to the Show Secretary by 3 pm on the day of the Show.
11. After judging has taken place no exhibit may be altered or removed before 4.30 pm , except by special permission of the Show Secretary.
12. The committee reserves the right for its official representative to visit by appointment, before or after the show, gardens from which plants, flowers, fruit or vegetables have been entered in order to satisfy that the conditions governing competitive exhibits are fulfilled.
13. Liability or Loss - all exhibits, personal property etc. will be at the risk of the exhibitors and the Society will not be liable for compensation for loss or damage from any cause whatsoever. Should a Show, for any reason, not be held, no exhibitor will have any claim on the Society.

Clearing-up: We would be most grateful if all exhibitors could help at the end of the show by emptying and stacking the vases in the containers provided.

## Dahlia Sizes refer to the diameter of the bloom

Only the size of the pompon changed from 50mm (2") to 55mm ( $2^{1 ⁄ 2}$ ") in 2016
Pompon not to exceed $55 \mathrm{~mm}\left(2 \frac{1}{4}\right.$ '")
Miniature Ball between 50mm \& 100 mm (2" \& 4")
Small Ball between 100 mm \& 150 mm ( 4 " \& 6")
Miniature flower not to exceed 100mm (4")
Small-flower between 100 mm \& 150 mm ( 4 " \& 6")
Medium-flower between $150 \mathrm{~mm} \& 200 \mathrm{~mm}$ ( $6^{\prime \prime} \& 8$ ")
Large-flower between 200 mm \& 250 mm ( $8^{\prime \prime} \& 10^{\prime \prime}$ )

NB - Pot plants must have been in the possession of the exhibitor for at least six months before the show except classes 26 \& 27
All will be viewed from any angle
Inside rim of pots to measure max 8 " ( 20 cms ) except class 26 max 6 " ( 15 mm )

## Class

28. Collection of 6 kinds of vegetables, one dish of each.

The numbers constituting dishes in the collection must be those specified in the single dish classes. To be staged in a space not exceeding $24 " \times 30$ " ( $61 \mathrm{~cm} \times 76 \mathrm{~cm}$ ).
Pointing will be equal for each variety of vegetable (max. 20 points each)
29. Beans - French - a dish of 6
30. Beans - Runner -a dish of 6
31. Beetroot - a dish of 3 - Globe
32. Carrots - a dish of $\mathbf{3}$ - long pointed (tops trimmed not tied)
33. Carrots - a dish of $\mathbf{3}$-stump rooted (tops trimmed not tied)
34. Courgettes - a dish of 2
35. Cucumbers - a dish of 2
36. Garlic - a dish of $\mathbf{3}$ bulbs
37. Leeks - a dish of $\mathbf{3}$
38. Onions - each bulb over 250 gm , a dish of $\mathbf{3}$ (tops tied with raffia)
39. Onions - each bulb under 250 gm , a dish of $\mathbf{3}$ (tops tied with raffia)
40. Parsnips - dish of 3
41. Peppers, hot (chilli) - dish of 6 (any variety)
42. Peppers - sweet dish of $\mathbf{2}$ any variety
43. Potatoes - white, a dish of 4
44. Potatoes - coloured, a dish of 4
45. Potatoes - a dish of $\mathbf{3}$ coloured \& a dish of $\mathbf{3}$ white

## 69. Mary Berry's Coffee Victoria sandwich

$80 z / 225 \mathrm{~g}$ self raising flour
2 teaspoons of baking powder
$8 \mathrm{oz} / 225 \mathrm{~g}$ caster sugar
$80 z / 225 \mathrm{~g}$ soft margarine
4 medium eggs
2 heaped teaspoons instant coffee

## Topping/filling

$60 z / 175 \mathrm{~g}$ icing sugar, sifted $2 \mathrm{oz} / 50 \mathrm{~g}$ soft margarine 1 tablespoon of coffee essence (or 1 tsp instant coffee dissolved in 1 tablespoon of hot water)
1 tablespoon milk (optional)

Method: preheat the oven to $180 * \mathrm{C} / 350 * \mathrm{~F} / \mathrm{Gas} 4$. Grease and base line 2 x $8 " / 20 \mathrm{~cm}$ sandwich tins with greased, greaseproof paper. Place the eggs in the bowl and stir in the coffee until dissolved. Add all the other ingredients for the cake and mix well until thoroughly blended and smooth. Divide the mixture between the tins and level the surface.
Bake in the pre-heated oven for about 25 mins until the cakes are well risen and the tops of the cakes spring back when lightly pressed with a finger. Leave to cool in the tin for a few minutes before turning out, peel off the paper and finish cooling on the rack.

Butter cream - blend together the ingredients and beat until smooth, adding the milk if necessary. Use half the butter cream to sandwich the cakes together and spread the remainder on top.
